General types of housing

- Single housing
- Semi detached housing
- Terraced housing (terraced housing)
- Apartments (blocks and city blocks)



Detached housing

- A stand-alone house (also called a single-detached dwelling, detached residence or detached house) is a freestanding residential building.
- It is sometimes referred to as a singlefamily home, as opposed to a multifamily residential dwelling.



- IT IS A FREE-STANDING RESIDENTIAL BUILDING.
- GENERALLY FOUND IN LESS DENSE URBAN AREAS THE SUBURBS OF CITIES, AND RURAL AREAS.
- SURROUNDED BY A GARDEN.
- GARAGES CAN ALSO BE FOUND ON MOST LOTS



- The individual unit is usually related to the terrain, benefiting of a court or a terrace and of direct individual or paired access from the ground level.
- This category makes the transition from individual housing to collective housing of a higher degree of density.



• A semi-detached house (often abbreviated to semi) is a single family dwelling house built as one of a pair that share one common wall.

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 They consist of pairs of houses built side by side as units

Usually the plan is a mirror image

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
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
• It is half way between terraced and detached houses.




- Starting from the singular and abstract typological unit represented by the individual house, the first category is driven by multiplying, joining or overlapping multiple units.
- The configurations generated by those operations are either classical attached or row houses, either contemporary types of folded row or stacked houses.

- ✓ HIGH-RISE APARTMENT








Stepped city block






Mixed Solutions

- The mixed solution typology involves combinations of the above, justified by context and project brief.
- There are no precise formal categories for this typology.





- Mixed type housing refers to developments that include a range of dwelling unit types that appeal to different kinds of occupants such as studio apartments and detached homes.
- Many communities are both mixed use and mixed type.
