


### Frank LLoyed Wright

1867 - 1959

- Became known to EU designers by the end of the 19th century
- Evolved from curvilinear art nouveau towards a rectilinear approach to spatial organization
- Focused on the dynamic interior space and not the facade
- Space is the essence of design
- Inspired by Japanese architecture



Frank Lloyed Wright, the Kaufmann Residence, 1935




Frank Lloyed Wright, Meyer May House VI, Grand Rapids, MI, 1908













#### The Vienna Secession

1897 - 1932

- A group of Austrian artists, painters, sculptors and architects banded together with the motivation to experiment with the new and reject emulation of the old.
- They rejected the refusal to allow foreign artists to participate in Kunstlerhaus exhibitions and against the support for traditional art
- Orominent members were
  Gustav Klimt & Kolomon Moser







# Wiener Werkstätte Vienna Workshops

1903 - 1932

- Inspired by William Morris and the English Arts and Crafts Movement
- It was founded by Koloman Moser and Josef Hoffmann
- Restoring the values of handcraftsmanship to an industrial society in which such crafts were dying.



- Its members had close ties to the artists of the Vienna Secession and the Art Nouveau movement.
- The Wiener Werkstätte's work in jewelry, furnishings, interior design, fashion, and other areas, which often celebrated the beauty of geometry
- became widely known for elegance and innovation, and this "square style" influenced the work of the Bauhaus craftsmen in the 1920s




# Deutscher Werkbund German Association of Craftsmen 1907 - 1938

- German artists organization
- was founded in Munich in 1907
- Organization of artists influential in its attempts to inspire good design and craftsmanship for mass-produced goods and architecture
- Composed of artists, artisans, and architects who designed industrial, commercial, and household products as well as practicing architecture.



- The group's intellectual leaders, architects Hermann Muthesius and Henry van de Velde, were influenced by William Morris
- Van de Velde and Muthesius expanded Morris' ideas to include machine-made goods
- Believed in unity & form
- Designers should design object that could be mass produced.
- The form of an object should be derived from its functional logic
- Aim is to put Germany on a competitive footing with England and the United States.




#### **Peter Berhnes**

1868 - 1940


- Appointed as artistic adviser for all AEG products 1907
- His contributions included the hexagonal trademark of the AEG, its catalogs, and its office stationery, products such as electric fans and street lamps, and retail shops and factories. Between 1909 and 1912 he built the AEG factory complex.






Peter Behrnes, covers for Berlin Electric Works Magazine, 1908




